

Early Care & Education Programs in North Carolina *Did you know that...*

• 6,340 child care centers and family child care homes are in North Carolina?

• higher stars mean that the program has met a higher standard and provides increased quality for children? In North Carolina there are:

• NC Pre-K serves at-risk children who are four years old, in private and public sites across the state? In North Carolina there were **1,165** sites with one or more NC Pre-K classrooms in fiscal year 2017.

• Head Start provides a range of services for children and families, including classroom settings and home visiting? In North Carolina, **519** sites provided Head Start services in fiscal year 2016.

• to be accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) means that a program has voluntarily chosen to meet higher national standards related to teacher education and programmatic standards? In North Carolina, **112** child care centers are accredited by NAEYC as of December 2016.

• 2,658 child care centers enroll children birth to three years old and 3,759 child care centers enroll children 3 to 5 years old in North Carolina?

• 888 family child care homes enroll children birth to three years old and 618 family child care homes enroll children 3 to 5 years old in North Carolina?

• on-going professional development ensures that teachers continue to strengthen their skills in providing early care and education to children? In North Carolina, **25,267** early educators participated in professional development activities in fiscal year 2017 provided by or through a child care resource and referral agency.

• **2,361** teachers, directors and family child care providers living in the State participated in the T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® Project in fiscal year 2017? There were **990** child care programs that sponsored their employees returning to school through this scholarship program.

• programs receive ongoing help through on-site assessments and technical assistance in order to provide the highest quality services for children and family? In fiscal year 2017, **6,177** classrooms serving children birth to five in North Carolina received technical assistance through a child care resource and referral agency.

• when child care sites enroll children through the state subsidized child care program, the reimbursement received by the child care provider is based on the age of the child and the site's star rated license level? Reimbursement rates have not been increased to match the actual payment market rates, so child care programs are not receiving adequate funding for the services they provide. For example:

| North Carolina | Maximum Reimbursement Rate - (rate the provider receives) | Market Price - (reflects what private payment would be) | Percent of Market Prices Covered by the Reimbursement Rate |

| 2 Year Old / 4 Star Center | \$652 | \$815 | 80% |
| 2 Year Old / 5 Star Center | \$750 | \$1040 | 72% |
| 4 Year Old / 4 Star Center | \$606 | \$780 | 78% |
| 4 Year Old / 5 Star Center | \$679 | \$975 | 70% |
