

## Infant and Toddler Care in Martin County

• Approximately **427** infants/toddlers in **Martin County** live in families where their sole or both parents work.

• 8 centers and 5 homes in Martin County provide early care and education to infants and/or toddlers.

• In **February**, **75** infants/todders in **Martin County** were enrolled in centers. This number compares to **126** enrolled in centers prior to the pandemic\*.

• In **February**, **6** infants/toddlers in **Martin County** were enrolled in family child care homes. This number compares to **8** enrolled in homes prior to the pandemic\*.

• **51**% of infants/toddlers in **Martin County** are enrolled in high quality care (at 4- and or 5-star rated center or home). This compares to **65**% enrolled in high quality care statewide.

• Market rates in high quality programs in **Martin County** are as follows:

The market rate is obtained through a survey administered to all child care providers statewide. Though market rates do reflect a higher cost of care for younger children, at all age groups, they only reflect what parents can afford to pay, not the true cost of care.

• **31**% of children (birth through 5) in **Martin County** receiving subsidy are infants/toddlers. This compares to **31**% of infant/toddlers receiving subsidy statewide.

• The infant/toddler teaching staff make on average **\$11.00** per hour compared to the three to five year old teaching staff who make on average **\$12.45** per hour.

• Infant/toddler teachers and assistants tend to have less education than their counterparts teaching three to five year olds. **Fifty-three** percent (**53**%) of the infant/toddler teaching staff have an associate degree or more in any field compared to **69**% of three to five year old teachers.
